



What's happening in the Classrooms... 6th and 7th grade Health

As the first semester is coming to an end so will be our semester long Health classes. Our 6th grade Health class just finished our program of Life Skills before Christmas Break. After break we will take a summative test over lessons 11-15 and finish up. The swap classes are half done with the material. We will start getting into our talks about how to have good communication with other people. 7th grade Health will also be finishing up its semester work. We are finishing our work on physical activity and fitness.

Where it all began! E.W.B. (Elmer Washington Bryant) Curry was just 17 years old when he started his very first school in Delaware Ohio in January of 1889. Dr. Curry's neighbor, Isaac Merriday, offered his kitchen shed, located at the back of his house, for Dr. Curry to use. Curry rented the kitchen shed for 50 cents per month. Dr.Curry also taught at the Delaware Night School for 2 years and he was the first African American to teach at the night school. Once the Shed School started, he charged his students 25 cents per week for tuition.. He called his school the "The Place of Knowledge for Old and Young". Dr. Curry's school accepted all genders, races, and ages (from 12 and up). For example, Curry's first student was a 50-year-old man who was a day laborer. Dr.Curry was such a distinguished person that on Wednesday, Oct. 9, the City of Delaware unveiled an honorary street sign commemorating the life and work of Elmer Washington Bryant Curry (1871-1930).

Dr. Curry moved his school to Mechanicsburg Ohio in September of 1895. The school opened with 19 students and 3 teachers. After the first year the school did not have any graduates and it started losing support in the community. So in order to keep up the school's support Dr. Curry and his then fiance held their wedding ceremony and invited everyone to it. Later in September of 1897 the Baptist Association removed the support and closed down the school. Brothers Charles Swayne, W. T. Hill, D. R. Jones and J. H. Chavers recommended Urbana to Dr Curry.

6th grade ELA

During the second quarter, 6th grade ELA students read the book <u>Maniac Magee</u>. We studied vocabulary and began answering questions using the RACE response. The RACE response has students restating the question, answering the questions, citing evidence from the story to support their answer, and explaining how the evidence supports. We also started teaching figurative language which we will continue during the 3rd quarter.

7th grade ELA

7th grade ELA just wrapped up reading Ben Mikaelsen's <u>Touching Spirit Bear</u> while focusing on elements of plot as well as figurative language. This story is a great coming-of-age story that teaches the students the importance of friendship, forgiveness, and second chances. The students are currently working on a final project for the book to show their understanding of the story's many themes. Finally, in the coming weeks we will be shifting our focus to reading a dystopian novel titled <u>The Giver</u> by Lois Lowry with a focus on argumentative writing.

8th grade ELA

8th grade ELA completed the novel Don't you Dare Read this Mrs. Dunphrey before winter break. The novel taught students the importance of journal writing. The remainder of this quarter will be used to teach the skills and techniques of narrative writing. In 3rd quarter, 8th grade ELA will continue to expand their knowledge of reading and writing using select short stories.

<u>6th and 7th grade UJHS Math</u>

6th and 7th grade UJHS Math students have been focusing on problem solving with percent and applying their skills to real world situations like dining out, shopping, and borrowing/investing money. UJHS 8th grade students have been working on solving equations with variables on both sides and investigating different solutions which may result. Also, 8th graders have been investigating the slope of a line given a graph, ordered pairs, or an equation. Utilizing real world applications like a roof or stairs help to develop concrete student understanding.

Also, Please be aware that many students have not yet met their ALEKS topic goal for the 2nd quarter. This counts as an important summative grade that will impact the final grade for Math for all 6th, 7th and 8th grade students. Please check ProgressBook and discuss this upcoming goal with your UJHS student to make sure that he/she is working to meet this goal.

LLI 6,7, and 8

Students in Mrs. Lacy's class took part in a hands on approach to reading. After reading about "National Cookie Day," they then took part in making their own cookies. Each student was given a cookie package with ingredients and were instructed to read and follow directions. Once they finished the cookies they were instructed to take a picture of their tasty treat, and shared it with me for their final product. I can proudly say with this homework assignment I had a 100% completion rate. My hope is that they will continue their love for reading recipes and make many more tasty treats.

6th Grade CSF

Students in 6th grade CSF have been practicing block coding. They are creating programs that lead a Sphero Bolt through a maze. Students loved working with the "robots" and did a great job working through the frustrations of working with new technology.
